CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Curriculum Development: The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University (SPPU), Pune and hence it follows the curriculum prescribed by the University. Academic activities of the College are monitored by the Academic Council of the Modern Education Society. Heads of Departments review the academic activities of their departments and guide the staff accordingly.

Teaching and Learning: Standing Committee, Local Managing Committee and Heads of Departments together monitor the teaching-learning process in the College. Guest Lectures by eminent personalities are organized periodically by different departments for motivating the students for guidance and for giving them a taste of cutting-edge technology. The college has established regular contact with renowned Institutes like NCL, ARI, CMET, IISER Pune, IITM and IUCCA which the PG students visit regularly for project work.

Examination and Evaluation: The Senior College Examination Committee looks after all aspects of the Examinations. The college appoints a faculty as Chief Examination Officer who is in In-charge and responsible for all aspects of the Examinations, both Internal as well as External. Continued use is made of the Examination Module of Vriddhi software approved by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. The Internal Examination is conducted as per the rules of SPPU. In addition to this, surprise tests, open-book tests, home assignments, seminars, group discussions are also included.

Research and Development: Many of our faculty members are recognized Ph. D. and M. Phil guides in Savitribai Phule Pune University and other Universities and they are actively involved in guiding students as well as faculties from other institutes as well. Several Departments of the college like Chemistry, Physics, Geography, and Geology are recognized Research Centers of Savitribai Phule Pune University. The Heads of Departments encourage faculty members to take up minor and major research projects.

Library, ICT and physical infrastructure/instrumentation: There is sufficient provision in the College Budget for the purchase of the latest books etc. and the stipulated budget is utilized before the end of the financial year. The Library Committee monitors the purchase of books, journals, encyclopedias, e-books and e-journals.

Human Resource Management: Modern Education Society is a Teacher Managed Society, There are three elected Local Managing Committee members from amongst the teachers. These members aid and assist the Management in the smooth running of the college in accordance with the Maharashtra University Act. Modern Education Society carries out the actual Recruitment of Faculty and Administration and Support Staff depending on the workload and availability of posts. Proper Selection procedures are in place for recruitment. Applicable Merit and reservation policies are strictly followed.

Industry Interaction/ Collaboration: Placement Cell/ Placement Officer in various Departments conduct appropriate training/placement activity and training sessions. Some Departments have Industrial training as part of the

course work Industry experts are invited for guest lectures, seminars, workshops, etc. Admissions of students: Admission of students is entirely based on Merit and reservation criteria as per State Govt. Rules and SPPU. PG admissions are carried out with proper counselling and with complete transparency.

The college has 2 vice principals and several heads of the departments, along with statutory bodies like IQAC and Local Managing Committee which look after the academic and administrative aspects of the college. Human Resource Management

Modern Education Society is a Teacher Managed Society, the Staff can openly express their views, put forth their difficulties, and interact frequently with the Management. Each Head of Department conducts regular meetings at the department level to monitor smooth functioning of the department as well as takes feedback from each staff member regarding completion of the portion, whether he/she needs to conduct extra lectures, concerns related to students, etc. In many departments like the Chemistry department which is the largest department of the college several committees like Program and Hospitality, Purchase Committee, Placement Committee, etc. are operating regularly and records of meetings and activities are regularly operative. This helps the smooth day-to-day working of the departments. Heads of departments encourage and depute faculty for participating in different seminars, conferences, and workshops. Discussions of assignments and laboratory experiments take place in each department at the beginning of each term. Coordinators for- Arts Circle, Students' Welfare, NSS, NCC, Internal Complaint Committee, Anti-Ragging Cell, Mahatma Phule Adhyasan, Placement Cell, Samata Mandal, Staff Academy, Examination Committee, Vigilance Squad, Gymkhana Committee, Discipline Committee, UGC Committee, Admissions Committee ensure smooth functioning of the College. To encourage and appreciate the good work done by the teachers, felicitation of teachers for excellence in work at the time of Scholar's Day and Gymkhana Day is carried out. Dr. M. V. Gokhale award and the Platinum Jubilee award have

been specifically instituted for this purpose Modern Education Society carries out the actual Recruitment of Faculty and Administration and Support Staff depending on the workload and availability of posts. Proper Selection procedures are in place for recruitment. Applicable Merit and reservation policies are strictly adhered to

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

There is sufficient provision in the College Budget for the purchase of the latest books etc. and the stipulated budget is utilized before the end of the financial year. The Library Committee monitors the purchase of books, journals, encyclopedias, e-books, and e-journals. Each department has a separate Purchase Committee which monitors their requirements, procures and processes quotations, and recommends the principal to issue Purchase Orders for equipment, etc. that is required. A computerized Attendance System is developed in-house and is regularly used by some of the departments to maintain students' attendance for lectures throughout the year. Different departments encourage students to familiarize themselves with the use of ICT. For instance: a) The Electronics and Computer Science students use circuit simulators to test their designs. b) Electronics students use CAD tools for PCB design (Electronics). c) Geography students use GPS instruments for practical experiments on mapping. d) Free Software is downloaded for the use of staff and students in the mathematics department. Several other departments also follow this practice. Some of the open-source software used in teaching which allows the students to do experimentation free of cost on their own are SCILAB, PSPICE, PHOENIX, TORA, LATEX, BIOEDIT, FASTA, BLAS, and PHYLIP. e) Various departments use animations in their PowerPoint presentations to explain difficult concepts. Several departments show Educational Films of academic interest to the students.

Curriculum Development

Academic activities of the College are monitored by the Academic Council of the Modern Education Society. The teachers from various departments are

encouraged to be involved in the syllabus framing/restructuring of the undergraduate and post-graduate courses of Savitribai Phule Pune University and other autonomous colleges/Universities. Heads of Departments review the academic activities of their departments and guide the staff accordingly Modern electronic devices such as Mobile phones, laptops were included in the curriculum of the Vocational Electronic Equipment and Maintenance course.

Teaching and Learning

Standing Committee, Local Managing Committee, and Heads of Departments together monitor the teaching-learning process in the College. Effective teaching is achieved by adopting several modern tools like Power-Point Presentations, open-source software, educational films, etc. Classroom attendance is taken regularly. Guest Lectures by eminent personalities are organized periodically by different departments for motivating the students, for guidance, and for giving them a taste of cutting-edge technology. The college has established regular contact with renowned Institutes like NCL, ARI, CMET, IISER Pune, IITM, and IUCCA which the PG students visit regularly for project work. Students are exposed to a high level of research methodology and the use of sophisticated instruments and facilities. Most teachers prepare Study Notes for the students and some of them upload them on the internet for easy sharing with the students Some teachers prepare skill-specific hand-outs for the students and share those on their websites Students are encouraged to participate in various Summer Schools and summer projects during vacations.

Examination and Evaluation

The Senior College Examination Committee looks after all aspects of the Examinations. The college appoints a faculty as Chief Examination Officer who is in In-charge and responsible for all aspects of the Examinations, both Internal as well as External. Continued use is made of the Examination Module of Vriddhi software approved by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. We continued to adopt a uniform pattern of marking scheme for the Internal Examination. The 10 internal marks for

the semester pattern and 20 internal marks for the yearly pattern are decided based on 30 and 60-marks question papers respectively which are then appropriately scaled down. Objective, as well as subjective questions, are asked in these question papers which prepares students for the final university examination which improves their performance. Credit Grade Based Performance Assessment and continuous evaluation was introduced by the University for the first time in 2013-14 for PG students and is continued since then. At least two regular tests are conducted for every course. In addition to this, surprise tests, open-book tests, home assignments, seminars, group discussions, and extension work are also included. These conferences also help to create collaborations with faculties

from other Institutes as well as to set up ties with other Institutions which in turn help with their work. The Heads of Departments encourage faculty members to take up minor and major research projects and some of them involve other members of the department as co-investigators to allow them to know about research methodology. The English Department has a Research club for M.A. students wherein the students along with a faculty member read an original paper based on literary texts. The college encourages students to participate in Avishkar, a State Level Inter-University Research Project Competition for UG/PG/ Doctoral students. This is done to improve their research and development skills

They are also encouraged to go in for Spoken English and Business English courses which are held at the Centre for English and Foreign Languages in the Sister Institution – Ness Wadia College of Commerce.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Paper-less, eco-friendly inter-departmental communication is encouraged. The college has at number of places, drinking water taps for refilling water bottles to avoid plastic wastage and encourage reuse of water bottles. Increased use of electronic media for sharing notes etc. leads to less paper wastage at departmental levels. There is a total ban on smoking and tobacco in college as mentioned in the college prospectus. Separate dry and wet trash bins for proper waste segregation and management are made available The campus is very green and beautiful. Periodically, tree plantation is carried out to increase the Green cover even further.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1) MoU signed with the associations: College initiated MoU with Science Education Initiative (SEI)-India, an NGO that selects the UG science students and trains them to become supplementary primary teachers in PMC schools and low-income schools. The first batch of 14 students has been enrolled for training under this scheme. These students earn Rs. 3000/- pm at UG level and Rs. 15000/- pm at PG level. This is a significant contribution to the betterment of science education. MoU has been signed between Nowrosjee Wadia College and Training Institute of Poona Blind Mens Association to set up a computer laboratory for visually impaired students in college. 2) Special Assistance to Visually Impaired Students: The college attracts a large number of visually impaired students. The Louis Braille Writers Club which been functioning in the college for the last 7 years to help these students. The students of our college as well as volunteers from the society in general assist the visually impaired students as writers during their exams. They also help them in their day-to-day college activities including reading out study material to them and ancillary tasks associated with their academics. A computer lab has been set up

in the college for visually impaired students in association with the Technical Training Institute of The Poona Blind Men's Association. Computers are made available to visually impaired students. A full-time computer trainer has been appointed to teach a computer to visually impaired students. Writers for visually impaired students are provided by the parent institution as a part of their social commitment. Many of these students benefited from this training in the sense of getting jobs in banks and offices.
